






*Get ready to go!*



You have probably heard me say more than once that all of God's people must go through a "wilderness" period.




Sooner or later, we must go from

land.




We are getting close to that time,

Here is a brief summary of  
chapters 1 – 3 of Deuteronomy:


- 
- They are now at the edge of the promised land!
  - What was suppose to be an 11-day journey had become 40 years of wandering
  - Now they are finally preparing to enter the land that had been promised to them
  - Deuteronomy means “second law”, because Moses gives them the law a second time


Moses

After their training on Mt Sinai for 2 years, he told them to leave and they headed toward the promised land.

- When they arrived they asked Moses to spy out the land, so Moses chose 12 men from each tribe.
  - They rebelled, did not want to go into the land and were afraid of the people of the land.
  - Even though Moses encouraged them they refused to go and would not trust the Lord.


- 
- God was angry with them and punished them and even Moses also could not go in because of them.
  - After many years wandering and after the unbelieving generation had died, God sent them toward the promised land again.
  - Now God began to make the nations afraid of them and they defeated the two great kings, Sihon king of Heshbon (king of the Amorites), and Og king of Bashan.

# How are we like them?

- They were delivered from Egypt.
- We have been delivered from the power of the world.
- They were brought to a place where God taught them and changed their thinking
- God is calling us to re-evaluate all that we do, in the light of His word. Everything must be reconsidered – our traditions, worship practices and, in particular, our character.

# How are we like them?

- They had to learn to obey in order to defeat their enemies.
- We also are learning to obey, so that we can defeat our enemies.




# How are we like them?

- He has been speaking to us about the times that we are in.
- He has reminded us and showed us again and again that He is in control of the affairs of men.

# How are we like them?


- He is bringing us to a greater place of unity for His purpose

**Deu 4:1** - "Now, O Israel, listen to the statutes and the judgments which I teach you to observe, that you may live, and go in and possess the land which the LORD God of your fathers is giving you.

# What must we listen to:


- **Statutes** – things that are marked out so that you can see what to do.
- **Judgments** – things that are determined for his people to do, judged to be right or wrong
- **Commandments** – things that are obliged to do; we must do them


# What must we listen to:

- **Testimonies** – things that are beyond – pictures that speak/testify of things to come
- **Ordinances** – things that guard or watch over us – they remind us to watch our ways
- **Precepts** – things that are noticed or visited – to do with proper conduct and behaviour







Deu 4:5 - "Surely I have taught you statutes and judgments, just as the LORD my God commanded me, that you should act according to *them* in the land which you go to possess.

1. Listen
